CONTEST GUIDELINES

- Registration for Dancers and Drummers opens at 4pm on Friday, July 4 and closes at 11pm. Registration opens again at 11am on Saturday and closes at 5pm on Saturday, except for non-contest drummers who register with Drum Coordinator daily.
- Contestants must have full regalia during Grand Entry. They must wear suitable and appropriate attire for the contest which they are competing.
- 3. Contestants are eligible to register in up to two (2) categories and any Dance Special for which they qualify.
- 4. If the contestant has any major component of their regalia fall/drop off or falls/drops off during a contest, they are disqualified for that session voluntarily or by Judge/ Arena Director. Items not considered major are one bell or one hackle feather. Sportsmanlike conduct is appreciated.
- 5. Contestants must wear the number issued by the registrar during his/her category. The number(s) must be visible during Grand Entries and to the judges during the contest. Please display number(s) on right side if possible.
- 6. Contestants observed holding up the Grand Entry procession or leaving the dance arena before flags are posted will not be granted Grand Entry points. Contestants must comply with the directions from the Arena Director and/or Whipman/Whipwoman at all times or may be subject to disqualification from event and/or competition.
- 7. Points awarded as follows:
 - Grand Entry = 50 points
 - Participation = 20 Points (any dance requested by Arena Director such as Owl Dance)
 - First Place Judged Points = 30 points
 - Second Place Judged Points = 25 points
 - Third Place Judged Points = 20 points
 - Fourth Place Judged Points = 15 points
 - Contest Drums = rated on a scale of 1-10 for Response, Rhythm, Pick-Up, Beat, Singing and Timing
- 8. The Pow Wow Committee, contest judges or the Arena Director may disqualify contestants suspected of consuming or being under the influence of alcohol/drugs at any time for remainder of that day.
- 9. The Pow Wow Committee asks that no whistles are blown until after the announcer has stated the contest is over. If blown prior to, contestant is subject to a ten (10) point deduction from point total for each offense.
- 10. The Pow Wow Committee reserves all rights to alter, suspend, withdraw offer/promotion at any time.

HOW ARE DANCERS JUDGED?

 Judges look for mastery of the particular style, keeping good time with the song and ending on the last beat of the drum.

ETIQUETTE

- Show honor and respect at all times but especially during grand entry, when flags are present, and during dance specials. Grand Entry is held at the beginning of the Pow Wow where everyone rises to their feet as flag bearers and arena staff lead a parade of dancers into the arena.
- Listen to the Master of Ceremonies, or emcees, for event information. They will inform you of what is happening and give necessary instructions.
- Do not touch regalia or refer to as "costumes" as often times regalia is considered sacred.
- Do not cross the arena to get to the other side.
- Sit in appropriate areas. Seating closest to arena is reserved for dancers/elders. Grand stands are open to all.
- Ask permission before taking individual dancer photos. Event photos are allowed unless otherwise specified by emcee.
- The Inter-Tribal dance is for all tribes of all nations and ages, this is often a good time for first-time dancers or non-tribal members to participate.
- · No drugs, alcohol, firearms or pets.

Most importantly, have fun! We hope you enjoy celebrating our culture by participating in and enjoying our Pow Wow.

TRIBAL CHIEFS



CHIEF WILLIAM BURKE

Wet-Yat-Muss-Till-Lie-La-Kop-Pit (Umatilla Chief William Burke)

In late May of this year, Chief William "Bill" Burke passed away at the age of 94. Atwai Chief Burke served as a CTUIR chief since the 1980s until he joined his father, Atwai Chief Clarence Burke, and the Creator. Atwai Chief Burke served on the Board of Trustees, and many important committees and positions for the CTUIR.

TUK LU KEY OF THE UMATILLA CHIEF GARY I. BURKE

Chief Gary I. Burke is enrolled Umatilla and resides on the Umatilla Indian Reservation at Springhollow with his wife Kathryn Quaempts Burke. They have six children and ten grandchildren. Gary is the son of the late Chief Wish-Lau-Tu-La-Tin, Raymond T. Burke and Velma Patrick Burke. He descends from grandparents, Isaac B. Patrick and Ada J. Patrick, Richard T. Burke, Sr. and Ester Pond Johnson.



Tuk-Lu-Key (Umatilla Chief Garv Burke)

He was a carpenter for 18 years and returned to college and graduated in 1995. Gary is a graduate of Pilot Rock High School where he played basketball and football. He also took part in boxing, traditional war dancing and horsemanship which he learned from his father. He is a strong leader who encourages younger generations to utilize their treaty and traditional rights in light of changing times that brings new responsibilities. He has great respect for the old ways that have been handed down and believes they need to be protected and preserved for the next generations. "From the North, South, East and West I welcome you all to this year's Wildhorse Pow Wow."

PEO PEO MOX MOX OF THE WALLA WALLA CHIEF DONALD SAMPSON

Donald is the former Chairman and Executive Director of the CTUIR. Today the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla, Walla Walla, and Cayuse carry on the traditional leadership of our people long before the United States and the constitutional government of the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla, Walla Walla, and Cayuse. Traditionally the Tribes had selected "headmen" or Meyocht, which were often hereditary descendants of former chiefs. Their responsibilities were to care for the wellbeing of the people, to protect and provide for them, to listen to their wishes and be a spokesman or their behalf. In November, 2018 Donald Sampson took the name of his late father Peo Peo Mox Mox (Yellow Bird) who passed away in 2017. He also became the headman of the Wallulapum (Walla Wallas) people. Donald's father atway Walla Walla Chief Carl Sampson was given his Indian name Peo Peo Mox Mox when he was a young mar and he was "stood up" by his elders of the Wallulapum people in 1990 as the Headman.

HAND DRUM CONTEST

Hand Drum Contest begins at 11am on Saturday, July 5 and takes place in the dance arena. Teams of one to three (1-3) singers may compete. We allow one team per person (no drum hopping). Registered teams may participate on Saturday morning. The top four teams sing again at approximately 5pm that day and then in the finals on Sunday afternoon. Teams are open to all ages.

Prizes are

 1^{st} - \$750 2^{nd} - \$500 3^{rd} - \$350

DRUMMER'S GUIDE

- 1. Lead singer must register their drum group daily.
- 2. Each group must have a minimum of five (5) singers.
- 3. Groups must be ready when called upon and will not be called upon more than twice before moving on to next group.
- 4. Four starts on a contest song and four starts on an inter-tribal song.
- 5. Any group suspected of consuming or being under the influence of alcohol/drugs during the Pow Wow will be disqualified for that day and will forfeit day pay.
- 6. Day pay available to the first ten (10) drum groups who register prior to each Grand Entry.
- 7. No drum hopping allowed.
- 8. Drum roll call is fifteen (15) minutes prior to each Grand Entry.
- 9. Drum groups must be set up in the location assigned and set up in the same location for each session.
- 10. Drum groups must follow the direction of Drum Group Coordinator or designee.
- 11. Please, only drummers allowed in drumming area/tent.

The Wildhorse Pow Wow has remained a symbol of culture and is open to all in the spirit of gathering. We look forward to hosting dancers, vendors, spectators and honored guests every year.
